

Gender continues to significantly influence how women interact with the world, shaping both their experiences and society's responses. As highlighted by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, achieving equality faces deep-rooted and intricate barriers. These hurdles, where gender intersects with race, class, and sexuality, are complex and often hidden, yet incredibly harmful to women. Thus, our commitment to empowering women and helping them realize their full potential remains vital. Acknowledging the multi-dimensional path toward gender parity, our initiatives revolve around four core pillars: Personal and Professional Development, Networking, Advocacy & Activism, Community Building and Outreach. These domains are the cornerstone of our endeavors to dismantle the obstacles that prevent a more just and inclusive world for all women.

Personal & Professional Development

Ready, Set, Go and Ready, Set, Go+ are comprehensive programs supported by a partnership with the NYS Department of Labor. These initiatives are dedicated to aiding eligible women in broadening their horizons and achieving social, emotional, and financial goals self-sufficiency.

- *Ready, Set, Go* caters to women focused on securing employment as their primary objective. Participants benefit from complimentary private coaching, online courses, workshops, and access to professional attire through the Dressing Room. This program is tailored to assist clients in obtaining suitable employment opportunities.
- Ready, Set, Go+ is designed to empower women navigating through complex circumstances, particularly those disentangling themselves from abusive relationships. It offers personalized sessions, workshops, and online courses that equip participants with essential skills and information, such as assertiveness, financial literacy, effective communication, goal setting, basic computer skills, career exploration, job application assistance, interview techniques, and attire guidance, including shopping at the Dressing Room.

Managed through our *Mary Durham Boutique*, the Dressing Room is a vital component of our comprehensive service model. Women enrolled in our *Ready, Set, Go or Amunet* projects who can't afford a suitable wardrobe are able to take advantage of personalized assistance in selecting appropriate and attractive clothing free of charge.

By serving women at different milestones of their entrepreneurial adventure, from those with thriving home-based businesses or polished ideas to those still wondering if a business endeavor makes sense, we're creating a nurturing environment that meets various needs. This approach ensures that women at any stage of their entrepreneurial quest can find invaluable guidance, resources, and mentorship to advance their goals and aspirations.

READY, SET, DREAM!

• *Ready, Set, Dream* is specifically designed for women in the process of refining their business ideas and developing comprehensive business plans. It serves as a platform for nurturing entrepreneurial aspirations, aiming to support women throughout their journey toward becoming successful entrepreneurs.



• Mentorship Project Our mentorship component connects women with home-based businesses and those ready to start their businesses with seasoned women business owners who can provide knowledgeable support and guidance

The initiative, "Project Amunet" aims to address the needs of women experiencing abuse, particularly those who may not identify as victims due to societal perceptions that primarily associate abuse with physical or sexual violence. This initiative recognizes the equally harmful effects of emotional, psychological, financial, and verbal abuse, even if less visible. By acknowledging and supporting victims of these forms of abuse, Amunet creates a secure environment for them to confront their situations. The initiative goes beyond emotional support by providing a safe space and administrative assistance to navigate community services, serving as a crucial lifeline for individuals seeking to break free from toxic situations.

Empowering women in such circumstances not only helps them regain control of their lives but also lays the groundwork for a safer and more promising future. Amunet is a comprehensive solution that understands the multifaceted challenges faced by those in abusive relationships. It is designed to complement existing domestic abuse emergency and shelter services by reaching out to women who may be struggling but hesitate to burden current service providers, believing others are in more urgent need of assistance. The proposal seeks to offer independence and security to women in their journey towards a better life.

Mary Durham Boutique's (MDB) focus on recycling and resource-sharing creates a positive impact by bridging the gap between women with financial means and those on limited incomes.

Mary Durham Boutique (MDB) is dedicated to sustainable fashion by reselling gently used quality apparel, shoes, jewelry, and accessories.

The MDB Cares program, launched this year, exemplifies their commitment to the community and the environment.

Unique initiatives include:

- "Thru the Door," where women in need can select a starter wardrobe with no questions asked;
- "Sharing N-2-N," providing toiletries and apparel to schools and nonprofit agencies;
- "Only If You Live Here" Pop-up Shops offering no-funds-needed shopping events for residents in various facilities and
- "Monthly DSP Breakfast Mingle," fostering collaboration among nonprofit professionals in client services.
